

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

Y1 have been very busy this week.

In Math's, we have practised our number formation and learnt how to count forwards and backwards from 10. We have used numicon to support our understanding of this and enjoyed recognising the patterns of numbers getting greater when counting forwards and smaller when counting backwards.

In Writing, we have focused on our letter formation and spelling CVC and CCVC words. The children have been practising writing on the line and ensuring their letters are just the perfect size. We identified capital letters, finger spaces and full stops in a range of sentences and the children enjoyed completing this as a team.

In PSHE, we discussed the difference between good choices and bad choices. We shared some good examples of how to show kindness and drew some pictures to represent our ideas.

We were so lucky this week to have a PCSO in our classroom. We asked them all about what it is like to be an officer and they shared the importance of wearing their protective clothes. Some of us were chosen to wear it too and it was so heavy. We were also able to see a police car, sit inside it and hear the loud sirens. It was so much fun!

In Computing, we looked at different forms of technology in our environment. We were able to identify these in pictures and sort pictures into two groups, technology and not technology.

In Music this week the children met Mr Lynch and were introduced to a new song that they will be singing in music assembly. We talked about what rhythm is and following a steady beat using movements with our arms to helps us. Year 1 enjoyed their first singing assembly with the rest of the school this week and tried so hard to join in.

Last week we enjoyed our outdoor learning so much with Mr Cooney that we couldn't wait to go out again on Friday and join in with all the amazing activities he had planned for us.

What an amazing week Year 1 have had!

Year 2

We have had a very busy week this week in Year 2!

In maths, we have been building on our understanding of place value. We used the dienes with part-whole models to show the different value of the digits. We then used this understanding of tens and ones to begin to answer missing number problems. We also practised writing numbers as words all the way up to one hundred!

In our writing and history lessons we discovered our book this term is all about Queen Elizabeth II. We learnt what chronological order means and practised using adjectives in expanded noun phrases to describe monarchs through time. We started learning about Queen Elizabeth, using the -ed suffix to show that she lived in the past.

In music we learnt the chorus to 'All you need is love' by the Beatles and everyone participated really well with their singing. In RE, we learnt about the Creation story in Genesis and how Christians believe that God is the creator of the world. For science, we started to learn about different materials and their properties, exploring why different materials are chosen for different uses.

Homework

Our spelling homework this week focuses on some different Year 1 common exception words. I wonder who will be able to spell them correctly in our spelling test next week? For maths, we are focusing on writing numbers as words while our writing homework is all about using adjectives.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English this week, we have learned what a preposition is and have started to practice using these ready for our description of a stormy mountain. The children were able to use their WAGOLL to help them and they learned it what we call a word that describes the location of something. We have also practicing making super spooky similes that we are going to use in our writing.

In Maths we have continued working systematically to find all possible combinations if given 3 different digit cards. We have also looked at partitioning 3-digit numbers is non-standard ways.

In History, we recapped what 'pre-history' is and looked at some major features of the Stone Age such as neanderthals, fire, stone tools and shelters.

We have read some more of Killer Cat in shared reading and the children are loving how cheeky and sneaky Tuffy the cat is!

We had our first music lesson with Mr Lynch this week and the children started learning "All You Need Is Love" by The Beatles and then they practiced singing it as a whole school during singing assembly.

Year 4

This week in Year 4, we started our week with music with our new music teacher Mr Lynch. We have been looking at The Beatles song All You Need Is Love and looking at the pulse and the rhythm.

In English, we have been thinking about the qualities that we think make a good hero. We thought about what the inside of the hero such as bravery and intelligence and what they might appear outwards such as strong. We discussed how many people who we consider heroes today do not look like a typical superhero such as nurses. We have then been practising our retrieval skills from our new class book The Land of Roar. Finally, we ended the week looking at imperative verbs, those bossy verbs that tell us what to do which are very important when writing instructions.

In Maths, we have been continuing with place value and started by looking at standard partitioning and how we can split numbers into their place value amounts. We then moved on to looking at non-standard partitioning and how we can split numbers up into all sorts of ways. We moved on to thinking about how many hundreds, tens and ones make up thousands and finally 1000 more and less.

In Geography, we have been continuing to look at Europe. We used our investigational and research skills to complete fact files about information about Europe and thought about or locational language. #

In Science, we have started our new topic of animals including humans and have started our journey of the digestion system at the first stop of the teeth. We have been learning about the different types of teeth we have and what their functions are such as ripping, tearing and grinding. The children particularly enjoyed counting their teeth.

Year 5

This week in Year 5, we have been looking at Fronted Adverbials in Writing. We talked about how we use adverbials like this to help build cohesion and difference in sentence starters. We classified the adverbials into time and manner. Finally, we had a go at creating sentences using these and remembered to use a comma after each one.

In Maths, we have been continuing to build on our place value knowledge. We have counted forwards and backwards in powers of 10 with numbers up to one million. We also began to look at number lines and how to accurately place numbers on one by adding the midpoint and quarter points.

Our science topic this term will be all about 'Living Things and their Habitats'. Therefore, to start the topic we have recapped our prior knowledge of habitats and food chains. We could correctly place animals within their homes and recall what certain animals eat.

In Geography, we looked at the eight compass points. We then used this knowledge to find the direction from North America to countries and oceans around the world.

Finally, in Music we began to learn the song 'All You Need is Love' by the Beatles. We had to clap along to the rhythm and sang the chorus. It was lovely to hear everyone sing this together in our first Singing Assembly of the year!

HOMEWORK: This week the children will be expected to complete the two Learning By Questions Tasks (one English, one Maths) and 2 Reading Plus lessons over 80%.

Year 6

In Science, the children investigated further how animals have adapted to suit their environments, focussing on the bullfinch, the giant otter, the penguin and the camel.

Next week, the children will look at examples of rapid evolution.

In English, the children improved sentences from the book, 'What Mr Darwin Saw' using relative clauses.

They also improved sentences by linking together clauses using both subordinating and coordinating conjunctions.

In Maths, the children continued to look at the four operations of fractions and were able to convert mixed numbers to improper fractions and vice versa.

In Geography, the children researched the conditions of a rainforest - looking at the climate, the weather, the vegetation and wildlife found there, understanding that rainforests are one of the most biodiverse places on the planet. They were also reminded that South America is not just made up of rainforests but has a variety of biomes.

In PSHE, the children completed My Happy Mind, looking at how children can look after their brain.

2 green RPs to be completed over the weekend.

LBQ on Maths and Grammar - to be completed by Wednesday.

Please note, if questions skip on LBQ, this is because the programme is confident that the children are ready to move onto the more challenging questions.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? The video game Final Fantasy XIV launched in 2010, and, despite being critically panned, it saw an overhaul that has made it one of the biggest success stories in gaming. Its huge world, epic story and versatile combat system have continued to draw in new players, but there's a lot that trusted adults need to be aware of - not least the cost of paying monthly to play.

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ALWAYS ONLINE

Final Fantasy XIV is an MMORPG, which stands for Massively Multiplayer Online Role-Playing Game. Much like World of Warcraft, players create a character in a chosen class and level up by completing quests to gain power and items. The game requires a constant internet connection, whether you're playing on PC, Mac, PlayStation or Xbox, and there's no option to play offline.

REGULAR EXPANSIONS

As with similar titles in the genre, players can purchase expansions to unlock addition content for the game. Those without the expansions will be locked out of certain new quests and activities, meaning that young people who play regularly will potentially have the next release earmarked on their calendar, ready to buy it as soon as possible

IN-GAME PURCHASES & SUBSCRIPTION FEE

Users need to pay £8.99 per month to play Final Fantasy XIV, but there is a free trial. If someone stops paying, they'll lose access to their character (although they'll be able to pick up the payments again and resume where they left off). If a player forgets to cancel they payments, however, those subscription fees will continue rolling on automatically.

VOICE & TEXT CHAT

Final Fantasy XIV lets players send chat Final Fantasy XIV lets players send chat messages in-game or speak to each other over voice chat. On the one hand, that provides plenty of choice for how those enjoying the game can interact with their fellow fans. On the other hand, however, it's easier than in many games to receive unprompted messages from a stranger, with whom you constantly share your play space.

VIOLENCE

While Final Fantasy XIV has a fairly light tone throughout some of its quests, many involve killing enemies and sometimes even wild animals. The violence isn't especially strong more comparable to a cartoon or anime style but the act alone may make some children fe uncomfortable, if they're not yet able to separate fictional harm from the real kind.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

As with World of Warcraft, there's an element of addiction to Final Fantasy XIV. The gameplay loop can be quite engrossing, as minutes turn into hours and hours into days while playing alone or with friends. This can potentially load to missing real-life events, a lack of interest in any activities not related to the game and procrastination around responsibilities like schoolwork.

Advice for Parents & Educators

MANAGE PLAYTIME

30 Playtime limits are a great way to counter the addictive qualities of games like Final Fantasy XIV. They allow you discuss why it's still important to enjoy things outside of gaming while still letting a child enjoy playing online with their friends when it makes sense to do so. It's all well and good to have fun with a game, so long as they're able to step away and reconnect with the real world.

MAKE USE OF THE FREE TRIAL

The Final Fantasy XIV free trial is a generous one, with no limits on how long someone can play until their character hits level 70. That's easily dozens of hours for a child to go through the game, complete quests, and see if they enjoy it before purchasing expansions or subscribing to a membership. They may well move on to something else before you need to spend so much as a penny.

PLAY TOGETHER

The free trial makes it extremely easy to jump into Final Fantasy XIV and play alongside a child, provided they're old enough. Not only does that help you ens that stetings are adjusted for their privacy and safety, but it may also end up becoming a bonding experience for you both and any other family members th

REMEMBER, IT'S A PEGI 16

16 Despite its often-relaxing nature, Final Fantasy XIV carries a PEGI 16 rating for violence and drugs (although the latter is due to a character smoking a pipe on occasion). There's minimal blood, but characters can attack enemies (and other players) with weapons and spells. Take a look at some gameplay videos to see if the content is appropriate for a younger player.
